My dear Dr. Chavez:

It gave me great pleasure to receive the kind letter from you and your dear daughter, and I appreciate most truly all you say;- and we all reciprocate.

Your and Miss Leticia's little visit to us in our summer home gave my children and me so much satisfaction-, and each one of our guests spoke with enthusiasm of the conversations with you on all those subjects which are vital and are absorbing to us in these critical days through which our countries are living.

We must all go on steadily working for that mutual understanding among the nations

which will culminate in international relations founded on justice and peace.

Part of our work - the work of every thinking man and woman - is surely to bring to the conviction of all persons that the world is finally guided by public opinion, and that part of our individual responsibility is to help shape this public opinion!

I have a firm belief that your beautiful Mexico will emerge presently out of these trying conditions <sup>into</sup> ~~with~~ a new and promising future -; and I believe our President is going to control (with the country's support) those baneful influences in the United States which are making it much more difficult for Mexico to bring about order and peace within her own borders.

I send you cordial thanks for sending me your Geography, which is most interesting.
